VIII	WARDEN'S COMMENTS AND REMARKS	(1) Approximately 1/5 of those inmates who are actually eligible for parole are turned down due to the fact they have no place to go. (2) Need new single type cell block and an auditorium. (3) An increase of 50 guard personnel, so that outside contracts can be accepted. (4) Relocate prison armory. (5) Needs sewer tile for sewage disposal system. (6) A dormitory to provide housing for bachelor guards. (7) Needs one more gasoline operated fire fighting unit.
IX	CONCLUSIONS	Administratively this institution is being well operated. Industrial program is functioning as well as can be expected with what facilities are available. The farm site is well managed. Rating, satisfactory.
X	RECOMMENDATIONS	(1) That National Headquarters release construction budget as soon as possible. (2) New cloth for clothing and bedding should be allocated in early summer in order to permit sufficient time to complete tailoring before cold weather. (3) Obtain a director for academic and vocational training to absorb idle population. (4) Allocate funds to construct adequate shop facilities and equipment in order to provide employment for idle inmates. (5) Form work crews

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out of the present idle and clean up the yard and factories. (6) Construct an auditorium. (7) Relocate armory by transferring from present site in Custody Office to second floor of new administration building. (8) Construct a dormitory for guard personnel. (9) Provide institution with additional firefighting equipment. (10) A sewage disposal system should be installed as soon as possible. (11) Watch towers should be constructed at the corners of the perimeter wall. (12) Remove pig sty from inside prison to the adjacent farm tract. (13) Obtain training films through District Headquarters. (14) Provide adequate operating room equipment. (15) Provide additional athletic equipment. (16) All contracts whether Government or private, should be in writing. (17) Provide additional books for library.
